


Homelessness in Europe

Homelessness in Finland 1987-2021




Homelessness has decreased in Finland

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How Housing First?

- 2007 Committee of "four wise" proposes a complete change of the system: an apartment, a normal rental contract and adequate support = Finnish Housing First
- 2008-2019 Government programmes based on HF to reduce long-term homelessness and prevent homelessness
- State funding to buy and build housing, to convert shelters into supported housing units and to hire new support staff.



Housing First in Finland

- Housing as a basic human and social right
- Housing in normal surroundings/permanent homes
- Own **independent** rental apartment either in scattered housing or in a supported housing unit
- Own **rental contract** (normally for unlimited time)
- Adequate **support** if needed and wanted
- Autonomy/ unconditionality
- Normality

2020-2023 PROGRAMME

Housing First – principle was introduced: no shelters, but homes with own rental agreements. 2 143 new fats in total. 3 523 flats for people experiencing homelessness. Professionals and experts by experience were hired. Programme concentrated on preventing homelessness and special groups. Expertise by experience has become established as a part of homelessness work. The Cooperation programme aims to halve homelessness by the end of 2023. The programme emphasizes the responsibility of the municipalities.



What has worked:

- Prevention: Housing advisors preventing evictions
- Increasing social housing supply
- Experts by experience involved in planning
- Culture of collaboration
- Development network





What has not worked so well: Challenges and Failures

- Attitudes: Complacency
- More people need more support
- ICM has not always been intensive enough
- Lack of integration of basic social and health services
- Insufficient availability of rehabilitation for drug users
- Nimby
- Uneven development of HF thinking and practice
- Lack of small affordable flats

Housing First 2.0 change laboratory

For the national Housing first 2.0 Change Lab, researchers interviewed 18 experts and actors in homelessness work

Excerpts from the video-recorded interviews were used to introduce challenges and stimulate work in the Change Lab sessions

The Change Lab met six times, each session lasting around two hours

Between sessions, participants produced analyses and proposals for solutions for the following sessions

In the last two sessions, participants outlined a vision for the development of homelessness work in the coming years



FROM VISION TO PRACTICAL MEASURES

To achieve the vision, the Change Lab identified and described six 'spearheads', or concrete sets of proposals:

- 1. Enhancing the availability of apartments
- 2. Housing and services for clients with complex needs
- 3. Work and meaningful everyday activities
- 4. Early identification and prevention of homelessness
- 5. Integration of substance abuse, mental health, health care and housing services based on HF principle
- 6. Housing social work in structures of municipalities



1. Enhancing the availability of apartments:

- The production target of ARA apartments should constitute at least 35% of new production in MAL agreements
- The MAL agreements should include city-specific quantitative apartment objectives in line with the goal of halving homelessness and the allocation of apartments to homeless people should be ensured by determining a sufficient number of apartments for the homeless from the municipal rental housing portfolio

2. Housing and services for clients with complex needs:

- Prioritising housing solutions in line with the Housing First model when procuring services for homeless people
- Municipalities should take responsibility for the sufficient supply of services securing housing and successful domestic life
- The designated social worker in accordance with the Social Welfare Act should assume responsibility for securing the housing of a client in need of special support

2. Housing and services for clients with complex needs:

- Contact to social services should be established immediately in any housing-related crises
- Both the housing division and the municipal social services should be responsible for organising urgent housing
- The special needs of various client groups, such as homeless women, should be taken into consideration in personnel training
- The housing services for substance abuse treatment should primarily be based on leases and the effort to secure the resident's housing (even if the substance abuse treatment does not work)

3. Work activities and meaningful everyday activities:

- Low-threshold activities using social rehabilitation should be made available in all housing services for the homeless
- Social efforts should be made to enable clients to seek education, training and career paths
- Ensuring that the services are not mutually exclusive



4. Prevention, early identification of risks of homelessness and securing housing

- Increasing the availability of housing counselling
- Standardised processes and monitoring indicators should be created for cooperation with lessors and Kela
- Housing counselling should be included in the homelessness programmes of the state and municipalities as a key preventive action
- The structural cooperation of housing counselling and financial and debt counselling should be developed
- Implementation of the electronic toolbox compiled in the ASTA project for preventing the financial issues of tenants
- Promoting the availability of financial counselling
- Enhancing multisectorality in all levels of prevention
- ₂₇ Developing multisectoral cooperation

5. Integration of substance abuse, mental health, health care and housing services based on the Housing First principle

- Launching a cooperation network with cities for the development of a service integration for homelessness services
- Ensuring that the state's development subsidy for efforts against homelessness is implemented in accordance with the Government Programme
- Motivating and supporting the cities in preparing the projects
- Designating a contact person for efforts against homelessness in each city
- Organising a national joint development programme to support the fruitful implementation of projects
- Developing multisectoral services for homes
- Enhancing the cooperation between homelessness services and substance abuse services as well as a rehabilitative approach as part of the basic efforts in line with the Social Welfare Act

6. Housing social work in the structures of municipalities and local government regional authorities

- Clarifying the responsibility of the housing division in housing social work
- Involving professionals and experts by experience in the research, planning and assessment of housing-related social work
- Redefining the concept of housing social work based on research
- Paying attention to the situation of particularly vulnerable groups and the enhancement of a women-specific work orientation in the development of housing services
- Recording a quality and cooperation requirement and a requirement of implementing the Housing First principle in the procurement of housing services.



National programme 2020-2023

- Aim to halve the existing homelessness (and end it by 2027)
- 2. 11 biggest "homelessness" cities, city specific plans
- 3. Social housing share to be increased from 25% to 30% in new housing areas
- 4. Impact investing (outcomes contracting)
- 5. Housing advisory services will be statutory
- 6. Developing new low threshold services and forms of support in scattered housing
